Pastor's Letter October 2020

Dear family and friends of Church on the Cape,

As we read the gospels we find Jesus asking the disciples to do some things that seem to be impossible. He sent them out to use the power to cure the sick and cast out demons. When they only had five loaves and two fish, he asked them to feed five thousand. When Peter wanted to walk on the water, he asked him to come out and walk. He asked them to order a mountain to move then it will be moved, if they had faith size of a mustard seed. These all sound impossible and if he asked us to do it, our faith may have been tested just as theirs. Then I witness that things I once thought impossible happening around us too. Personally, it seemed impossible for me to pay for my three sons' college educations but I trusted that God will provide. And I experienced one miracle after another. Something that looked too big and impossible was proven to be possible when we trust God.

The pandemic created something that looked bigger than we could handle. As we enter into the season of Stewardship, I hope that you would be filled with gratitude for God's blessing for you and your loved ones. And with that gratitude and blessings in mind I pray that you would consider supporting your church to grow through your commitment of prayer, presence, gifts, service and witness. With God's grace and your commitment, we will continue to heal the sick, cast out the forces that bind people from being free and whole, feed the hungry, walk on the water, and move a mountain, because these are the reasons of why we are here at Church on the Cape, to fulfill the mission and ministry of Christ for the glory of God.

Right now, Mechuwana is facing its most serious financial challenge ever, but we are choosing to face this challenge and come out the other side stronger and more secure.

Leadership Covenant on Disagreement and Conflict

Concerning disagreements and conflict, we, the leaders of Church on the Cape will follow the guidance that Jesus gives in Matthew 18:15-17: "If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector."

Our objective is to cultivate a healthy and thriving environment for our church. In doing so:

- We will speak directly to the person or committee that an issue concerns. We will direct concerned people to speak directly with the person with whom they have concerns. If people talk with us conflicts about others, we will refer them to resolve the issue directly with the people involved or offer to meet with both of them together or to find them a mediator.
- If a person complains to us about someone else but refuses to directly talk with the person(s) to resolve the problem, we will first listen and then ask what action(s) the person will undertake to resolve the conflicts.
- We will refuse to carry a message from one person or group to another. We will not be part of "pass-through" communication.
- We will refuse to act on nonspecific or anonymous feedback.
- We will not perpetuate rumors. We will insist on an accuracy check on all rumors, by myself or the source of the rumor, by speaking directly with the people involved in the rumor.

We commit to this covenant out of love for each other and our church. As it says in James 1:9, "My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry".

Adopted by the Church Council on September 21, 2020.

The History and Records Committee of Church on the Cape

Purpose: "Remember the Past, Celebrate the Present, Inspire the Future"
HISTORY IS HAPPENING!

History was made on Sunday, September 20, at Church on the Cape! The third Sunday in September has been "Homecoming Sunday" for several years. On that occasion members of 20 years or more are recognized. This year Marie Campbell, now residing in Standish, was remembered for her 64 years of faithfulness in her life and prayerful service through the church. She greeted the virtual and very small congregation on-site via video taken by Pastor Ho-Soon Han. There are 68 other full members listed on pages 5 and 6 of this newsletter.

Persons who are 20-year members include: Gail Browning, David Emery, Kim Jarmas, Lynn Sanborn, and David Sandtorv. A 20-year associate member recognized was Robert McLaughlin.

In addition, the 25th Anniversary of the first "Hanging of the Buoys" was commemorated. Included in this was the following: "Today we renew the bond of faith and fellowship that has been part of our life together for generations with the village of Cape Porpoise, the community of the lobstermen, and the wider world." (Offered by the Church Historian, Ann Nelson, in her introduction to the service.) There were 43 original buoys hung in the church's foyer on September 24, 1995, with 9 added later. This month the History and Records Committee guided the hanging of 13 additional buoys; 3 others will soon be delivered. One of the buoys is from the youngest lobsterman, Nathan (Nate) Emmons who is 19 years of age.

The worship service included a video greeting taken by Wendy Emmons. This was from Gary Ridlon who is the senior lobsterman of Cape Porpoise. He and his late wife, Marge, collected and prepared the 1995 buoys for hanging.

The service also incorporated several hymns and readings. The names of the lobstermen were read in the following categories: the lists of the Retirees and Deceased Lobstermen were read by 6th generation lobsterman, Kyle Emmons; the list of the 1995 and 2020 lobstermen was read by Ann Nelson and with that reading, pictures of 6 lobstermen were projected. Kyle Emmons was also one of the speakers during the service. He spoke about the function and colors of buoys and also related his story about starting lobstering at 7 years of age with his father, Michael Emmons. He continued to share about how his lobstering career has progressed. He also brought one of his traps and a buoy to illustrate the children's message.


The buoys-of-the-day were displayed in the sanctuary during the service and were later taken to the foyer where Kyle helped to hang them.

For more than 160 years Church on the Cape has remained "a continuing source of unity and inspiration to the residents and friends of Cape Porpoise." (Tom Bradbury) "We acknowledge the vital role played by our fishermen of the past, present, and into the future. They perpetuate a commitment to the sea, which has been at the heart of this community's life for generations. Church on the Cape is proud to serve as a beacon for seafarers and as a place of spiritual nurture for pilgrims of all walks of life." (October, 1995 Newsletter.)

FINANCE REPORT AUGUST, 2020

The August Church on the Cape Treasurer's Report reflects the Payroll Protection Program amount of \$24,500.00, applied for in the early spring, used for payroll, has been approved as a grant to the Operating Budget at Church on The Cape, not a loan to be repaid. The income to the budget from January thru August now stands at \$197,557.86., with disbursements of \$189,715.50. This is a net increase of \$7,842.36 to the budget as of August 31st.

MISSING THIS YEAR to our budgeted income items due to Covid-19 are regular sales from the closed Cargo Shop, the annual July Ship's Cargo church fair, and loose plate offerings received during worship services. Summer visitors to Cape Porpoise have always supported the church given these opportunities. They continue to be missed.

NOT MISSING THIS YEAR to our budgeted income is the faithful pledge and loose plate support of the members and friends of the church. In addition, support to Outreach, especially as this relates to donations to local food needs, continues to be strong.

As on-line (virtual) worship continues, our offerings are presented with the singing of, "Praise God, from Whom all blessings flow". The Finance Committee at Church on the Cape remains grateful for the continuing loyal support of all the good that flows from this blessed congregation.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY UPDATE

It has been a while since my last update. Just prior to the Covid-19 shutdown, we dedicated one home in Limerick and the family moved in March.

The second Limerick home was dedicated in August and that family moved into their home over the Labor Day weekend. Site work on the Mills Road property has just been completed. The foundations for both homes on this site will be poured and capped. Meanwhile site work will begin (soon we hope) on land in Saco donated by the town, where Habitat is partnering with Hancock Lumber to build the first of two homes on this site. The plan is to complete one home there, then return to Mills Road in the spring.

The Family Support Committee is currently searching for a family for the first Saco home. Before the Saco project became a reality, we had reserved space at the COTC for activities relating to the Mills Road build. Then Covid -19 came along and everything was shut down.

The Saco project is now moving ahead on Hancock Lumber's time table. We are very blessed to have their support given the everincreasing price hikes and availability of product.

So going forward, how might COTC become involved? Our committee will begin the search for a family for the Mills Road home in October. We hope to be able to hold the Application Meeting in November, but where and how still depends on the status of rules relating to the pandemic. If COTC is an option by then, that would be ideal. We are also preparing a virtual presentation. In the spring, we hope to have the fundraising walk and pancake breakfast again scheduled with the church. When the Mills Road build begins we will plan to have some COTC workdays. This has been done several times in the past on Habitat builds and has been fun and very successful! Meantime we continue fundraising for both.

(www.habitatyorkcounty.org), or to our Facebook page for information. For those who may not know where the property is located, take Rte. 9 (Mills Rd.) about one-third mile from the church. You can't miss this beautiful site donated by our friend David Doubleday.
