Pastor's Letter

September 2021

Dear family and friends of Church on the Cape,

Recently my son Joel and I spent a few days in Acadia and on the first day we walked on Jordan Pond Trail. It was late afternoon and cloudy with an expected shower, so there were not many people. Not too long after we started walking, I noticed that the trail was not only beautiful but also absolutely guiet. The movement of water and air made no sound and it was like watching HDTV with the volume off. The only sound we heard constantly was our own footsteps. As I was listening to our footsteps on the trail, I found that even for the two of us it's not easy to be in sync with each other. It made me realize how difficult it must be when the new soldiers learn to march in regular, ordered, and synchronized steps in military formations. It would take an intentional effort and practice to walk in sync with others who have different walking paces.

Although we are not soldiers in the military, often the same intentional effort and practice are required for us to be in ministry together. We all have different paces in thinking, and in doing, and we all need to make an effort to find the collective pace that works for all of us while we are working together in the same mission and ministry of Christ.

Summer Festival and Concert of Praise was a great example. We had the same purpose and intention, yet different ideas and paces. And we constantly made the effort to be in sync with one another naturally and peacefully. As we made the effort, we learned that there are others who want to march with us. We not only had support from the members and families of the church but also from the businesses in the community—Bradbury Brothers, Carla's, Three Sea's Fish

& Lobster, and Nonantum Resort to name a few. It made us realize that we are surrounded by the people who love the church and who trust our ministry of making a difference in the community. It generated great energy we didn't know we had. And in addition to all the wonderful outcomes, making approximately \$5k was a bonus. I give thanks to God for all of you who contributed to the event and a big thanks to the Team—Sandy Day, chairperson, Susan Baracco, Fuzzy Farnsworth, Bill Hidell, Diane Hutchins, and Liz Phillips.

After hiking for two hours, I realized what matters the most is not if our steps were in sync, but the fact that our hearts were in sync and that we were heading in the same direction. Likewise, I realized what made the event successful was the fact that we were walking together in the same direction and in the spirit of harmony. We discovered that as long as our hearts are in sync with Christ and with one another, and as long as we are walking toward the same direction, our ministry together can be fruitful and effective. This experience will serve us well as we continue to work together on behalf of Christ and for the glory of God.

Even though we are still walking in the time of uncertainty with the COVID-19, I hope you take time to pause to recognize the signs of fall and celebrate the unchanging rhythm of God's creation and faithfulness. May you be richly blessed in the month of September!

HISTORY HAPPENINGS!

On July 27 three members of the History and Records Committee, Beryl Samia, Ann Nelson, and David Sandtory, and ex-officio member, Pastor Ho-Soon-Han, welcomed Heather and Tom Driscoll from Portsmouth who are restorers of stained-glass windows. (Their company's name is "Solder and Sash.") Ann gave them a tour of the church building soon after their arrival, and they began their assessment with the "Angel of Hope" window in Bartlett Hall. This window was given in 2008 by Bill and Annie Hidell. The Driscoll's said that the window is in excellent condition. They were very interested in the entire window and how its subject was enhanced by its artistry and unique construction. There were no recommendations needed.

They then entered the sanctuary and were very touched by the beauty of the windows. These windows were installed in 1908 and 1909 and are 113-114 years old. The Driscoll's inspected each window and said that they were in very good condition for their age. They found a few cracks and some grout failure, but "nothing to be concerned about." They reported that the windows will need another inspection in about 20 years. In 50 years there will be a serious need for restoration due to their condition at the When asked the price of such a restoration Mr. Driscoll hesitated and said that he seldom answers such questions. But he did respond that if the Ladies Guild window needed restoration today it could cost approximately \$60,000.00.

Following the sanctuary visit they went outdoors to assess the condition of the Lexan/plexiglass protective windows. These are generally in good condition with the open spaces allowing enough air through to prevent mold damage. Their condition needs to be determined on a regular basis in case of weather, or age damage. The windows once had heavy "rolled glass" protecting them. The front window on the parlor side is still covered beneath the Lexan window.

In order to keep the windows in good condition: be aware of them so that they don't deteriorate beyond repair; keep the protective glass intact and replace when needed; if possible, have a special fund for their future restoration.

The Driscoll's were very happy to have shared with us, and also enjoyed their visit to the History and Records Room and Gallery.

FOR EVERYTHING A SEASON

Wanting his sons to learn not to judge too quickly, a man sent each, in turn, on a quest to look at a pear tree far away and report what he saw. The first son went in winter, the second in spring, the third in summer and the fourth in fall. Finally, the father gathered the young men together. "What did you see?" he asked.

The first son reported seeing an ugly tree, bent and lifeless. The second disagreed, saying it was

budding with fresh new life. The third son reported finding a tree laden with sweet-smelling, beautiful blossoms, while the fourth insisted it drooped with ripe fruit.

The father said his sons were all correct, for they'd seen the same tree, though at different seasons of its life. "Don't judge a tree — or a person — based on just one season of life," he counseled his children. "Who they are can only be known at the end, when all life's seasons have been lived.

"Furthermore," he added, "don't give up on your own life if you experience a hard season, such as winter, or you'll miss out on the renewal of spring, the joy of summer, the fulfillment of autumn."

LABORS OF LOVE

Thomas Merton, an American monk, writer and social activist, said, "It is in the ordinary duties and labors of life that the Christian can and should develop his spiritual union with God." As the United States observes Labor Day (Sept. 6 2021), may we find meaning not simply in marking summer's end but in celebrating the ways nearly all "duties and labors of life" can empower ministry and faith.

Whether as a dentist, parent, artist, teacher, mechanic, gardener, city councilor, farmer, day laborer, attorney or anything else, a Christian can begin each workday or shift by praying for opportunities to serve whoever they'll encounter. We also can pray for and seek ways to grow in "spiritual union with God": cultivating spiritual fruits; actively loving God and neighbor; seeing Jesus in the vulnerable; practicing humility, gratitude and praise.

In Labor Day, may we find inspiration to make all our labors loving and faithful!
