

What a time in history this is for all of us. A time like no other in my lifetime. For many of us social distancing is an inconvenience. Not an easy time, but certainly not a true hardship. We are safe and snug in our cozy homes, able to connect virtually or by phone to those we love. There are people in our community, however, for whom this time is a serious hardship. Loss of jobs and income create instability in the basics of life: housing, food and healthcare. The local Rotary Clubs, along with the General Assistance Offices of Kennebunk, Kennebunkport and Arundel have teamed up with Community Outreach Services to address the challenges faced by members of our local community. Community Outreach Services has long been the "go to" organization for assistance in our community and they are increasing their capabilities during this time. They will be offering assistance with food, fuel and other specific needs.

But they need our help. The Church on the Cape has never hesitated to help in the wake of major disasters. This time the need is in our backyard. There are two ways members can help. First and foremost is monetarily. Members are encouraged to send checks to COTC with COS indicated in the memo line. Then one check will be sent to Community Outreach Services from our church. It would be wonderful to have a check sent to COS by Easter. A beautiful way to celebrate the love and joy of our risen savior and his gifts to us. Additionally, our Outreach committee will be adding to amount raised from members. Food Drive and Food Pantry items are also needed. These can be dropped off at the rear of the parking lot at St. Martha's Church on Rt.1 in Kennebunk. The hours for drop off are 12-4 Monday through Friday.

For those in need, the Food Pantry will have curbside pick-up Monday-Friday from 2-4. Food and specific need requests can be made to your town's General Assistance office. Friday Food Pantry distribution is at St. Martha's from 9-10 AM or until the food is gone. Food will be delivered to cars, so people may stay in their cars.

On behalf of the Outreach committee, I thank you for your support of our community. We will get through this time, but only if we band together.

Beryl arrived at Church on the Cape as the new organist and choir director in 2003; in 2004 she inherited a side gig from the late Keith McClelland: "The Senior Moments", a group of twelve or so singers in various ranges, that originated in the living room of one of its members. Beryl arranged for the group to meet in the choir space at COTC and they rapidly doubled in number drawing participants from local Episcopal, Presbyterian, Lutheran, Congregational, and United Methodist church choirs as well as including some secular singers. Beryl challenged the group with her selection of material leading them in weekly rehearsals from September through May. She whipped the Senior Moments into a shape which resulted in the production of two concerts a year, one at Christmas and another in late spring. From that modest sing-along gathering years ago, the group has evolved into a tuneful source of fun and inspiration not only for its members but also for the community at large.

Following the death of her husband, Beryl decided that it was time for her to retire from leading Senior Moments. On March 3, 2020 she spoke to the group and received much well-deserved affirmation and appreciation. She was the Accompanist/Director for 15 years and will be greatly missed. In addition to her strong faith and other special qualities, Beryl will be remembered for being very direct in her recruitment of members. One member recalls Beryl saying, "...she didn't have anything else to do and the chorus needed an alto."

HISTORY'S DARKEST DAY AND BRIGHTEST DAY

A professor once asked a young man studying for the ministry what the cross of Christ meant to him. The student said, "Well, the cruel death of God's Son, Jesus, was the most soul-shocking event imaginable. What could have been more heartless and eviler than the crucifixion of Christ, the most holy person who ever lived? That had to be the darkest day in human history.

"On the other hand, one has to consider what happened on the Sunday after his death on Friday. It is quite clear from eye-witness accounts that he arose from the dead and was recognized by his friends as the one they had called Lord. The Resurrection was such a soulstirring and momentous event that the first Easter Sunday had to be the brightest and most joyous day in the history of the world."

When he had finished, the professor said to him, "That is an excellent interpretation of the meaning of the cross. It was indeed a dark and hideous day when Christ was crucified. Yet that cross took on the symbol of salvation and hope when God raised Christ from the dead. Yes, Christians could say it was the brightest day in history."

TAKE CARE AND DO NOT WORRY

Life can sometimes be very difficult. We can have many issues and troubles that cause us to worry. Perhaps someone is having trouble getting employment, or may have recently lost a job. It can be a struggle to purchase the essential things they need, like food and clothing. Sometimes it is the events going on in the world that make people concerned, or even afraid of what tomorrow might bring. These types of issues cause people to worry and become anxious about the future. Worry just wears you down, and God is there to protect you once you have done what you can to protect yourself.

Jesus taught his disciples about how to handle such things. The key was first to put their trust in God. If they put their trust in God, there wasn't anything in life that should cause them to be worried. Jesus tells them, "do not worry about your life, what you will eat; or about your body, what you will wear. Life is more than food, and the body more than clothes" (vv. 22-23). His disciples needed the perspective that other things were more important than food and clothing.

To help them understand this, he told them to consider some basic lessons from nature itself. They could look at birds and flowers and learn not to worry. Jesus uses the lesson of the ravens. They don't plant any seeds or harvest any plants. They don't have a barn in which to store food. Yet God provides for them. Jesus reminds his disciples they are a lot more valuable to God than the ravens. He also told them to consider the lilies. They do not do any type of labor. Yet they are clothed better than even King Solomon was in his fancy, royal clothing. He reminds them that God will do the same for them.

Jesus tells them: "Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life? Since you cannot do this very little thing, why do you worry about the rest?" (vv. 25- 26). There was no point in worrying about their lives and what the future was going to hold. They cannot make their life

any longer by doing that. Their focus needed to be on the things of God. If they put their trust in God above all things, then everything else will take care of itself.

Jesus reminds them they are people of faith. Because of this, he tells them, "do not set your heart on what you will eat or drink; do not worry about it. For the pagan [those who don't believe in God] world runs after all such things, and your Father knows that you need them. But seek his kingdom, and these things will be given to you as well" (vv. 29-31). God is their heavenly Father. He is a loving Father, and because of that, they just needed to put their trust in him. If they do that and seek after his kingdom, then all the little things in life will be handled. A father knows very well what his children need, and God will take care of his children.

We, too, need to listen to the words of Jesus. We need to let God be our treasure and focus in life. Jesus says, "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (v. 34). If God is first on our list, then we don't seek after treasures and material things in the world. There is no need to worry about anything in our lives. Let us put our trust in our heavenly Father, and he will care for us.

POINTS TO CONSIDER

In what is often called the "Sermon on the Mount," Jesus taught the same lesson to his disciples. This is recorded in Matthew 6:25-34.

The apostle Paul writes in his letter to the Philippians similar thoughts. He said to them, "Do not be anxious [worried] about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians. 4:6-7).

Peter writes in his first epistle: "Cast all your anxiety on him [God] because he cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7).

Isaiah 11 prophesies hope for the world: wisdom, understanding, righteousness, justice, faithfulness, peace. In the words "a little child will lead them" (v. 6), Christians hear a foretelling of God's coming to earth as the child Jesus. Today, children — Jesus' examples of fitness for God's kingdom (Mark 10:14) — often lead in showing love.

At age 11, avid baker Michael Platt opened a pastry shop in Maryland to benefit homeless people; for desserts sold, he gives an equal number to shelter residents. Eric Schubert, 18, of New Jersey, uses his genealogy research skills to help strangers — more than 1,000 so far — find long-lost family. In Pennsylvania, Neijae Graham-Henries became a certified barber at age 7 to give free haircuts to kids who couldn't afford them. (Stories shared on GoodNewsNetwork.org.)

May these children inspire us to use our passions and skills for good, in the name of the Christ-child, who grew up and taught us to serve others in love.

HISTORY HAPPENINGS

"Remember the Past, Celebrate the Present, Inspire the Future."

Your History and Records Committee is pleased to give this update on our planning and activities:



1. **Sunday, March 8**: the Committee gave the description of our local church history for the first membership class of the year.

The group was greeted in the Parlor of Peace and were led in sharing by **Pastor Ho-Soon Han**. Chairperson, **Beryl Samia**, welcomed the class and read the "Theme" statement, continuing to set the tone. Historian, **Ann Nelson**, described the paintings in the parlor and gave the story of the 2 collections of embroidered signatures. She also pointed out the print of Salmon's "**Head of Christ**" which hung on the wall of the sanctuary prior to the current cross.

Secretary, **Stedman Seavey**, gave a presentation of the history of Cape Porpoise and the first church. He continued with how the **faith was nurtured by the Methodists** beginning in the early 1800's to the present. We then gave a brief tour beginning in the **foyer** with an introduction to the **buoy collection**; and continuing into the **sanctuary** where interest was expressed about the **stained-glass windows**. Then, upstairs, **a historical display** of books and documents laid out and the group visited the **History and Records Room and Gallery** and the **Children's Sunday School Room**. This was the first time we had made such a presentation; we are glad to report that it was well received.

- 2. Sunday, May 17: Heritage Sunday-a service of worship commemorating the 25th Anniversary of the Hanging of the Buoys in the church entryway. Current lobstermen and the one lobsterwoman and their families will be invited to participate and their buoys will be hung with the others. Those who are deceased will also receive recognition. Chip Howarth has made the Shaker peg hangers. Thank you, Chip!
- **3. Architectural blueprints** of the additions to the church in the 1990's have been documented and are now stored in archival boxes. They may be found in the wooden trunk in the History and Records Room. All of the committee members participated in this project with a special "thank you" extended to **John Nelson** who lent his expertise to make the boxes the correct length.
